Bohemians in Paris – A Night of the Arts



This event's showcase of each classroom's wide variety of visual and performance

art was a delight to watch by all of the family, friends and staff who attended the show on April 28th.

The first student artwork exhibit was held in the Middle School. One of the highlights of the Middle School's display included an original musical performance of songs collaboratively written by the students who participated in the Introduction to Singing and Songwriting Elective. Kamila Doran and elective instructor, Tara Middleton, serenaded the

audience with "Hey Friend" and "Music is our Medicine," melodies that were recorded into CD form as a finale of the class and written by the students. Students also exhibited storybooks filled with personal narratives and poetry, as well as abstract art, interpretive art, and perspective pieces.

Next, Upper Elementary performed poetry, sang songs, and displayed

various artworks. Students performed a song about the solar system, which described each planet in order, allowing them to learn about the solar system in a fun and interactive way. Next, Upper Elementary students sang the alphabet in Spanish while simultaneously using English sign language to sign the letters



as they sang. Students constructed various crafts, including mandalas made of sticks, yarn, and various other nick knacks that made each one unique and beautiful.

Lower Elementary portrayed their artwork in the form of voice, performing various songs taught by Annette Foldes. Her extensive professional music instruction was made possible by a

generous grant from Sedona's Artist in the Classroom program. For the Lower Elementary performance, students sang a medley of songs from the *Mary Poppins* musical, and *Sing!* by the Carpenters. Annette stated that she chose songs that would allow her students to learn rhythm, tempo, pronunciation of lyrics, and musical

cues indicated by her instruction and by the piano. "Kick Your Knees Up" was accompanied by strategic clapping and stomping by the students, which was a great example of some of the techniques they learned during their singing class. Students from LE also created Azoic art, as well as 3D art.

Each student's creativity contributed to a great accumulation of artistic talent and hard work on display.

Catalina Coastal Science Field Trip

Beginning on May 3rd, a group of nine Middle School students will commence upon a much anticipated field trip to Catalina Island. An exciting series of activities have been planned throughout their weeklong visit. The students and chaperoning teachers will visit the Mountain and Sea Adventure Science Camp, where they will observe, study, and interact with ocean life.

Students will also enjoy snorkeling adventures, including a night dive to observe bioluminescent sea life.

During class instruction this semester, 8th graders have been looking over information regarding ocean environments, food webs, and aspects of ocean ecology, which will give them a basis of information going into the science camp. Students will also be spending a night on the Queen Mary ship, a retired ocean liner that sailed primarily on the North Atlantic Ocean from 1936 to 1967.

There will be no shortage of fun and educational activities on this field trip!

Advanced Math in UE

With the last day of school being less than a month away, Upper Elementary students have not wasted any time in completing their work, especially when it comes to math. Each student is given an allotted amount of work to be completed each week in



each subject. Bill Baker, UE Principal Educator, reports that all 42 students in his classroom have completed their math work for the entire year, which means that they have been striving above and beyond their weekly assignments. Thirty four of the UE students have taken the initiative to work on assignments that were intended for next year, and some are as far as 63 assignments ahead. The students are displaying their ability to be autonomous learners by their outstanding ability to complete more than what is mandatory in their math lessons.

Four students from the Upper Elementary classroom decided to apply their advanced math skills at the Tri-City Math competition with their 7th and 8th grade peers. Our 6th grade representatives were the youngest contestants in the competition. Although they were faced with complex math problems, they were excited by the opportunity to further challenge themselves beyond their current accelerated accomplishments. The students reported that they had fun and felt lucky to be given such a learning experience, and were honored to be some of the only 6th representatives from the Verde Valley.

Tri-City Math Competition

On April 23rd, ten Middle School Students travelled to Prescott to represent Sedona Charter School in the Tri-City Math Invitational. Since participating in March's Yavapai County Math Contest, the Middle School students prepared for their upcoming competition and focused on

specific strategies of preparation.

Students completed problem sets from 7th and 8th grade math exit exams, and especially focused on the problems that were most frequently missed in these sets in order to improve

their knowledge in a well rounded way.

The competition was composed in three parts. First the students participated in the team competition, where small groups of students opposed each other to solve a series of 10 questions in 45 minutes. In the second portion, individual students were given problem sets to complete

alone. The winning individuals from each school moved on to the third round, called the College Bowl. Ana Stecklein, Alexia Miller and Drew Maguire participated in the third and final round where they were tested with the most advanced questions of the tournament. The College Bowl

portion was organized in a Jeopardy theme, where students raced to hit their buzzers when they were ready to declare an answer.

Middle School Math Teacher, Tim Marsh, stated

that this year he was trying to get a feel for the various math competitions and what seemed to be most beneficial for his students. Both Tim and the 7th graders have expressed that they have found this year's tournaments to be both helpful and fun, and plan to make at least one competition an annual occasion.

Tara holds that creating music has been an amazing outlet of expression throughout her life, and she instructed her class with the intention to give the capacity of expression to young adolescents, encouraging her students to transform their beliefs into lyrics. 

Lucy attributes many of her accomplishments to lessons she learned at Sedona Charter School. One of her most memorable moments was learning something about her own moral compass, "Throughout the school year, we had opportunities to earn funny money for things like good behavior and answering questions in class. On the last day of school, we had a field trip to the

local park, where we had the opportunity to spend our funny money on prizes. After I bought an item, I noticed that one of the teachers had given me the wrong change back. Somehow I ended up with significantly more money than I was supposed to. I approached Mrs. Burke and Mrs. Calhoun, explained the situation, and handed them the extra money. They didn't take the money and allowed me to keep in, saying that I had earned it by being honest. I'll never forget that moment, when they taught me that honesty is something to be rewarded for."

In addition to lessons of integrity, Lucy also learned important lessons that would benefit her in future high school and college endeavors. "The Montessori education allowed me to explore and develop my individual talents by offering a range of classes to choose from. I learned how to work with others through group projects.

In college, I was required to do many presentations both alone and in groups. My education at SCS also required
