Exploring Our World Online

Our Lower Elementary staff have been using a variety of methods to offer online lessons to our students. On Flipgrid teachers have been posting mini-lessons about different subjects. Tuesday through Friday a teacher will post a video about a subject that interests them and then assign a follow-up activity for the students. Some subjects covered include: the planets in our solar system, composting, three sisters



gardening, Morse code and the telegraph, different types of rocks, the importance of exercising, and poetry. Many students have responded enthusiastically to these minilesson videos and enjoyed their follow-up activities.

We have also begun online reading groups for our students. While we do not have the materials to do a reading group with every level of reader in our classroom, we are working towards making this a possibility. Right now Ms. Katarina, Ms. Amy, Ms. Haley and Ms. Alexander are leading biweekly groups and Ms. Stephanie is working on weekly groups. Some of the reading groups have assigned papers to complete each time they complete a reading section as well as a job to do during our Zoom meetings.

Ms. Katarina is working with students one on one offering Zoom math lessons. Students have enjoyed stamp game addition and



division and abstract multiplication. One student even built her own stamp game out of rocks!

We are constantly adapting our distance learning program and trying to meet the needs of all students while making academics meaningful and fun. Engineering Learning

Middle School continues to evolve in this new online paradigm. We connect in as many ways as possible, using Flipgrid videoing, Zoom groups and classes, and meeting individually online. Our approach has been adjusted to keep in mind that we all need to move and have hands-on experiences in addition to learning lessons online. We are listening to our students and families, incorporating their ideas and needs, and making our education a group collaboration. We are very thankful for the participation of our students and parents in this journey!

In ELA, students began book groups together. Each small group explores a new book together, meeting once a week on Zoom to discuss, analyze, answer questions, and define vocabulary. In language class, students are researching and creating videos about different holidays around the world. Our unit on "Empathy" is providing opportunity to extend ourselves into the community, finding ways to help others in isolation from our homes, including writing to and making art for the senior friends we've made this year from Sedona Winds and Cottonwood Village. We are also looking at our current events through the knowledge of all that we have learned this year about government, economy and healthcare. And in science, students are practicing strict adherence to the scientific method, creating clear, strong



experiments right in their own homes to prove or disprove their theories. So far these include comparing heart rate while holding breath under water compared to in air, which surfaces get the most bounce from a




basketball and whether microwaved water causes different results in plant growth than non-microwaved water. Scientists in action. And we need strong scientists!

how to walk and talk. Kids figure it out by watching their parents and imitating their actions.

The power of learning by observation should not be overlooked for musicians. Great musicians gain new insights by watching and listening to other musicians make great music. Exposing students to a variety of musical styles increases their musical intelligence and will help to inspire new goals.
